In 2024, one hundred and twenty-two journalists and media workers, 14 of whom were women, were

killed worldwide. This figure is close to last year's toll of 128, which was among the five deadliest years since the International Federation of Journalists (IFJ) began its Killed List in 1990. In 2024, the IFJ also recorded a 30% increase in imprisoned journalists. The number of iournalists and media workers imprisoned rose from 393 in 2023 to 516 in 2024, highlighting the worsening state of press freedom worldwide.

fundamental The right to inform is being increasingly undermined by governments.

The Gaza Strip once again accounted for nearly 50% of iournalists killed worldwide in 2024, with 64 casualties.

The figure is devastating for the small 360 km² territory, which had just over two million inhabitants in 2022 and has suffered 152 journalist deaths since the war began. The IFJ has repeatedly urged respect for the Geneva Conventions and International Humanitarian Law, but apparently to no avail. For months, the IFJ has gathered evidence that nalists have fallen for the second

targeted journalists. Some of these cases are now being compiled so that they can be sent to the International Criminal Court (ICC) as a formal complaint. Arrest warrants have been issued against Israeli and Hamas leaders, including Prime Minister Benjamin Netanvahu and Defence Minister Yoav Gallant, on charges of crimes against humanity and war crimes. The IFJ also mourns the deaths of five Lebanese journalists in this conflict and reports that

IFJ is deeply concerned by the 83% rise in iournalist and media worker fatalities in the Asia-Pacific region compared to 2023. Twenty-two journalists lost their lives there this year. A significant increase in targeted killings has been noted in Pakistan, where six

out of seven journalists were shot by mobile gunmen. India has seen similar targeted attacks, with three journalists killed; and in Bangladesh, five journalists were killed, three while covering pro-democracy protests.

In Latin America and the Caribbean, the numbers of crimes against jour-

consecutive year, with nine killed in 2024, compared to eleven in 2023. Mexico continues to be the most dangerous country in the region, with five of the victims being Mexican. The IFJ points out that 95% of crimes against journalists in Mexico remain unpunished.

In Africa, the number of journalists killed remains stable, with ten fatalities in 2024 compared to nine in 2023. However, the IFJ is gravely concerned about the situation in Sudan, where the international community has largely abandoned the country. The country's ongoing civil war has claimed the lives of six Sudanese journalists this year. The IFJ also recorded two journalists killed in Somalia, one in Chad, and one in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The latter was a collateral victim of the ongoing civil war between the M23 armed group (March 23 Movement) and the government.

In Europe, the war in Ukraine claimed the lives of four journalists. Three were killed in bombings by both warring parties, while a Ukrainian journalist was declared dead by Russian authorities during a transfer from prison.

Finally, while it remains difficult to quantify the exact number of imprisoned journalists, according to the information available as of 31 December 2024, 516 journalists were behind bars. This is an alarmingly high number, likely underestimating the true extent of the situation, given the frequent arrests worldwide, often for short periods and for administrative purposes.

Protecting journalists and combating impunity are now more crucial than ever. Press freedom, a cornerstone of democracy, is under severe threat and demands immediate global action. The IFJ once again calls for the adoption of a UN Convention to protect journalists, an initiative that has never been more urgent.

TRIBUTE TO BRAVE WOMEN JOURNALISTS KILLED IN 2024

For yet another year, journalists have been victims in a world in which war and political conflicts continue to grow, often leading to universal revulsion and condemnation. Journalists in general face many risks in reporting these conflicts. But women journalists are exposed to even more risks, as they are often physically attacked, especially when covering controversial topics such as politics, human rights or corruption.

Women journalists are also more likely to be followed or monitored, notably in environments where press freedom is under threat. Moreover, in some regions journalists are considered vulnerable to being kidnapped or trafficked, especially when reporting in high-risk areas.

We must remember all the international legislation that protects women against violence, but is not respected in many countries, including in those where there is no conflict.

Nor should we forget that women journalists may lack access to gender-specific protective equipment, such as bullet-proof vests designed to fit women's bodies.

In 2024, 14 female journalists were killed, most of them in Gaza. This conflict, which is also claiming many civilian lives, is particularly dangerous for women journalists: in some cases, they have been killed along with their partners and children. Although Palestine has the sad record of being the country with the most journalists killed, we should not forget other ongoing conflicts, such as those in Ukraine, Sudan, Iraq, Philippines and Syria.

Most unusually, we can celebrate the fact that no journalists were killed in Latin America in 2024.

In Palestine, on 9 January, journalist Heba Al-Abdallah was killed when an Israeli bomb hit her home in the southern city of Khan Yunis in the Gaza Strip, media reported.

On 12 February, Alaa al-Hams, a freelancer who worked for local media, died of her wounds, according to PJS and media. Al-Hams was seriously injured two weeks earlier, when an Israeli bomb hit her home in al-Geneina neighbourhood in the city of Rafah, southern Gaza Strip. On the same day, Libyan TV journalist Angham Ahmed Adwan was killed, following an Israeli air strike that hit her home in Jabalia city.

On 31 May, Ola al-Dahdouh, a journalist for Radio Watan, was killed in an Israeli bombing of her home on Al-Jalaa Street in central Gaza City.

On 30 September, Wafa Aludaini – the founder of and a journalist for the October 16th Media Group – was killed along with her husband and two children in an Israeli air strike in Deir Al-Balah, central Gaza, according to media reports.

On 27 October, Saed Radwan, head

of the digital media department at Al-Aqsa TV, Hamza Abu Salmiya, a journalist at Sand News Agency, and Haneen Mahmoud Baroud, a journalist at the Al Quds Foundation, were all killed in an Israeli air strike that hit Asmaa 'B' School in the Al-Shati refugee camp in the northern Gaza Strip.

On 11 December, Eman El-Shanti, a journalist for Voice of Al-Aqsa, was killed in an Israeli air strike that hit an apartment in Al-Malash Tower in Sheikh Radwan, north-western Gaza City. The strike also killed El-Shanti's husband and their three children.

SYRIA

On 1 October, Safaa Ahmad, who worked as an anchor for Syrian State television, was killed in an Israeli air strike on the capital, Damascus. Ahmad was the first journalist killed in the country in 2024.

On 19 December, two Kurdish women journalists, Cîhan Bilgin, and Nazim Daştan, were killed in a reportedly Turkish drone attack. They were covering the fighting between Ankara-backed militia and US-backed Kurdish fighters in northern Syria.



On 23 August, journalists Hero Baha al-Din and Golestan Tara were killed while travelling on the road linking Sulaymaniyah city and the district of Sayyid Sadiq. A Turkish drone bombed their car, which was carrying a group of media personnel from Sterk TV. This TV station is part of the Chatr Media Company, licensed by the Kurdistan Regional Government. Both journalists were killed in the drone attack. Rebin Bakr, who was responsible for digital media at the Chatr Media Company, was seriously injured.

UKRAINE

On 19 September, freelancer Viktoria Roshchyna was killed. Ukraine's government spokesperson confirmed the death of the Ukrainian journalist, who was being transferred from the south-western city of Taganrog to Moscow for a prisoner exchange on 19 September. The reporter went missing while reporting in the Russian-occupied territory in August 2023. Russia's Ministry of Defence confirmed her detention in May 2024.

SOMALIA

On 18 October, the award-winning Somali-Swedish journalist Amun Abdullahi Mohamed was murdered by two gunmen with reported ties to the insurgent group Al-Shabab. Mohamed was a prominent journalist, known for exposing extremism and the activities of Al-Shabab through her investigative reporting. According to reports, Somali authorities have opened an investigation into her murder.


SUDAN

On 9 December, Hanan Adam, the only female journalist killed in Africa this year, was murdered by members of the Rapid Support Force (RSF) in her home in Wad Al-Asha in Al-Jazirah State, together with her brother, Youssef Adam. Hanan, whoworked at the Ministry of Culture and Information in Al-Jezirah State, was also the correspondent for the Al-Maidan newspaper of the Sudanese Communist party. It is believed that she was killed because of her work as a journalist.

PHILIPPINES

On 22 October, eMedia Production Network Radio anchor Maria Vilma Rodriguez was shot three times in the abdomen by unidentified assailants on a motorcycle, near her home in Zamboanga City. She managed to walk home to alert her daughter about her injuries, before being transferred to Zamboanga City Medical Centre, where she was declared dead that evening.

Every year, there seems to be something unique in the way that journalists are killed on the African continent. Most of the journalists who are killed there are murdered because of their work, either to silence them or to deny them access to information that is crucial for citizens. It is also clear that journalists who live in conflict zones, or are covering conflict, are specifically targeted by militias or warring factions. In the past few years, there has been a decline in the number of iournalists killed in conflict situations in Africa. However, 2024 saw a return to the horrible scenarios that we had thought would soon come to an end.

What is evident in almost every African country is that journalists are killed with impunity, since the perpetrators of these heinous crimes are not apprehended and tried in a court of law. Even in cases where some arrests were initially made, we are yet to see those arrested prosecuted. This is indeed very worrying.

In 2024, ten journalists from four countries in Africa – Chad, Somalia, the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and Sudan – were killed. All four countries are highly unstable politically and very prone to conflict. Currently, Sudan is a deadly zone for journalists, with the conflict continuing to claim the lives of journalists and many civilians. Six journalists were killed in Sudan this year, two in Somalia, one in Chad and one in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

As in previous years, the patterns of killings have been very gruesome, inhumane, senseless and worrying. It is difficult to understand why perpetrators of crimes against journalists continue to target the family members of the journalists in certain circumstances. Seven of the ten journalists killed in Africa were killed by warring factions, especially militias and government soldiers. These killings are intolerable and those responsible must be brought to justice.

Sadly, despite all the conventions, declarations and protocols guaranteeing the right to life and the protection of journalists in conflict situations – which have been signed by numerous African countries – crimes committed against journalists in Africa have been on the rise and most have gone unpunished. It is clear that protection protocols have neither been respected by the warring factions nor, most disappointingly, by government soldiers.

The plight of African journalists covering conflict or living in conflict-affected areas is deeply worrying. The Africa Union and its State Parties, and particularly the Peace and Security Council (AU), must make the safety and security of journalists a top priority. African governments must implement, to the letter, the conventions and protocols that they have ratified relating to the safety of journalists. Moreover, these governments must demonstrate the political will to ensure that the perpetrators of crimes against journalists, especially those who kill journalists at will, are apprehended and brought to justice.

In only one in every ten killings does a case end up going to court, as perpetrators are rarely apprehended. African governments must put an end to a situation in which crimes committed against journalists go unpunished. Impunity has no place in any democracy, because it undermines good governance and the rule of law.

Journalist Muawiya Abdel Razek's home in El Dorshab, north of the capital Khartoum, was also raided by the RSF on 4 June. He was killed together with three members of his family by armed soldiers in Ei-Fasher, capital of North Darfur State. The perpetrators are still at large.

Hanan Adam, the only female journalist killed in Africa this year, was killed by the members of the Rapid Support Force (RSF) in her home in Wad Al- Asha in Al-Jazirah State, together with her brother, Youssef Adam. Hanan who worked at the Ministry of Culture and Information in Al- Jezirah State was also the correspondent for the Al-Maidan newspaper of the Sudanese Communist party. It is believed that she was killed in relation to her work as a journalist.

1 MARCH

Four of the six journalists killed in Sudan were killed by members of the Rapid Support Force (RSF), while Khalid Balal was killed by armed soldiers supporting the government. This shows that journalists covering the conflict, or those who live in areas affected by the conflict, pay a heavy price for their journalistic work. Five of the six journalists killed in Sudan were killed by the parties to the conflict, yet no arrests have been made for any of these killings.

5 JUNE

Initially, some arrests were made; but no one has yet been convicted for Idriss's murder. A journalist at Radio Communataire de Mongo, Idriss was specifically targeted for murder due to his reporting on the community conflict. He had received numerous death threats in relation to his reports.

SOMALIA

Amun Abdullahi Mohammed

18 OCTOBER

As indicated earlier, the militia and security forces of the parties to conflicts in Africa have become a huge threat to the safety and security of journalists, media workers and the media in general. Of the six journalists killed in Sudan, four were killed by the Rapid Support Force (RSF) and one by a member of the Sudanese army. Likewise, in Somalia, Award-winning Somali-Swedish journalist Amun Abdullahi Mohamed was murdered on 18 October by two gunmen with reported ties to the insurgent group Al-Shabab, n the Afgoye District, lower Shabekla region, 40 km south west of the capital, Mogadishu@. Mohamed was a prominent journalist known for exposing extremism and the activities of Al-Shabab through her investigative reporting. According to reports, Somali authorities have initiated an investigation into her murder.

Abdikarin Ahmed Bulhan 13 MARCH



Journalist Abdikarin Ahmed Bulhan, a reporter for the Somali National Television (SNTV) was killed on 13 March in the Abudwak district of the Galguduud region in central Somalia, when an armed security guard shot and fatally wounded him at the workplace. Abdikarin Ahmed Bulhan, who was not only a renowned journalist but also a community leader, succumbed to his injuries, after an armed security guard working in the same building fatally shot him in the head.




DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO (DRC)

Yoshua Kambere Machozi

6 NOVEMBER

The body of journalist Yoshua Kambere Machozi, reporter and sports presenter at the Mpety Community Radio Station (RCMP) was found along a river bank in Katobi, North Kivu, on 6 November. According to media reports, armed members of the rebel group 23 March Movement (M23), which still controls a large part of North Kivu, raided Mpety Community Radio Station (RCMP) on 29 October and looted all the equipment. In the assault, they kidnapped journalist Yoshua Kambere Machozi, while other workers of the radio station managed to escape.



AMERICAS

The figures for crimes against journalists in Latin America and the Caribbean have fallen considerably in the last two one of the deadliest years in recent history. However, between 2023 and 2024 the situation does not seem to have changed much and the figures were killed in the region in 2024, only one less than in the previous period. tries in the region.

In these cases, there are grounds to conclude that these crimes were motivated by the journalists' work or years compared to 2022, which was that they were killed while carrying out their work. COLOMBIA

Colombia also remains a very risky country for journalists, as demonstrated by the murders of Mardonio Mejia and Jaime Vásquez.

In addition, threats to media workers in Colombia continue to be one of the main barriers to exercising the profession. In 2024, a report by the Ombudsman's Office documented more than 500 violations of the human rights of journalists in Colombia in 2023. The report highlighted that, in 70% of Colombian territory, at least one journalist was threatened every 48 hours in 2023.

Threats are the first expression of a spiral of violence against our colleagues in Colombia and beyond. Far from being purely verbal attacks, these threats often have consequences. This can be seen in the exile of Nicolás Sánchez Arévalo and the self-censorship of the media outlet for which he works, after Vorágine received death threats for his investigations into drug trafficking and paramilitarism. In Colombia, there have also been cases of murders of media workers in which the motives are still unknown. As a result, these deaths have not been counted. But they show that the country continues to be mired in a deep security crisis, which has also negatively impascted Colombians' rights to free expression and information.

HONDURAS

In 2024, the region's first crime against a media worker took place in H o n d u r a s. Luis Alonso Teruel was murdered on 24 January. But his case is still under investigation to clarify the motives behind his murder and so it is not yet clear whether his journalistic work was the root cause. Three journalists were killed in the country in 2023, underlining the importance of investigating cases like Teruel's as a matter of urgency.

PERU

In addition to the crimes involving fatalities, there was a notable level of attacks on the press and violations of freedom of expression in different countries. In Peru, the National Association of Journalists documented almost 400 attacks in 2024, with the country's highest political authorities worryingly prominent.

ARGENTINA

In Argentina, the Freedom of Expression Report 2024 showed an unprecedented deterioration in the conditions for the exercise of journalism as well as access to information in the country. The report also noted a significant increase in attacks on journalists by government officials and supporters of President Javier Milei, a high number of media workers injured by police repression plus an upsurge in online violence, especially against women journalists.

EL SALVADOR

In El Salvador, there have been irregular actions against journalists by State authorities, such as the unjustified raid on Mónica Rodríguez, former leader of our affiliate, and Steve Magaña. Furthermore, the Association of Journalists of El Salvador (APES) filed a complaint with the United Nations for the arbitrary detention of Víctor Barahona in 2022, a direct consequence of the state of emergency imposed in the country by the government of Nayib Bukele. APES also recorded in its regular reports an average of more than 80 daily attacks on journalists on social media, including threats and harassment of colleagues with a marked gender bias, as 40% of the victims are women journalists.

VENEZUELA


The arrests of journalists in Venezuela during the coverage of this year's national elections, and the protests that followed, should be a wake-up call for the region. Although all journalists were eventually released from prison in the last weeks of 2024, the growing problem of the judicialisation of journalistic work in the region has regained momentum. Another example of this is the case of José Rubén

Zamora. He was temporarily released after being imprisoned for almost three years, but was returned to jail less than four weeks after his release. His trial was plagued by judicial irregularities and these continue to this day.

Despite the decrease in murders in the region, the threats, judicialisation of journalism and the low rate of case resolution are key factors in the continuing violence there. To guarantee dignified conditions for the practice of journalism in Latin America and the Caribbean, it is now essential to end impunity, for both crimes and threats against media workers.







Following a year of heightened political tensions and national elections in many countries in the Asia-Pacific region, the year closed with a grim death toll for the media industry and its journalists and workers. The IFJ's regional figures paint a bleak picture for the industry as a whole, with a torture. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa was

downward spiral in terms of press freedom plus worrying declines in labour rights and safety for journalists and media workers.

Despite the tireless efforts of media unions and press freedom associations, political repression and violent protests surged. The year was tainted by widespread impunity, exacerbated by draconian and excessive legislation in too many countries, as well as increased levels of censorship, inti-

midation and capricious incarcerations by autocratic governments and cronies.

The significant spike in targeted killings of journalists and media workers, from 12 in 2023 to 22 in 2024, is chilling and worrying - especially when killings are the most egregious tip of a perilous iceberg.

Pakistan was the deadliest country in the Asia-Pacific, with seven deaths recorded, mostly by gunfire. The country was also ranked second globally in the 2024 IFJ Killed Journalist List, coming after Palestine and its horrific murder toll since the Gaza conflict began in October 2023. Pakistan's political turmoil, triggered

by a sequence of three governments and a six-month constitutional impasse, saw Pakistan-Tareef-Insaf (PTI) protests spread across the country. Journalists have been among the main targets of armed attacks, killings, arrests, harassment and

the most dangerous area for iournalists with three killinas. followed by Sindh, with two murders, as well as Balochistan and Puniab. each with one. Journalist and President of the Khyzdar Press Club. Muhammad Siddique Mengal, was

sadly killed on World Press Freedom Day on 3 May, when an explosive device on his car detonated near Khuzdar, Balochistan. The attack followed a previous assassination attempt a year earlier, when he was fired on by unknown assailants.

Bangladesh (with five deaths recorded) and Myanmar and India (both with three deaths recorded) also highlight the parlous environment in countries where democracy remains fragile, under attack or is non-existent. Deaths were also recorded in the Philippines, Kazakhstan and Indonesia, each with one killing.

As Bangladesh descended into chaos

due to widespread student protests against former prime minister Sheik Hasina, journalists were among the casualties in July and August. An estimated 1,500 people died in the protests that brought down the repressive government and the country is still trapped in a mire of violence. With the installation of a new interim government under Mohammad Yunus, journalists covering matters of public interest remained at high risk of targeted attacks, as were those outlets seen as siding with the previous regime. Student protestors raided countless media outlets in 2024. leaving journalists in fear. In November, protestors also besieged the Dhaka offices of news outlet Prothom Alo, accusing the outlet of supporting the ousted former prime minister. In October, retired iournalist Swapan Bhadra was fatally stabbed outside his home, with his family alleging he was targeted due to his social media reports on local criminal elements and drug gangs.

In Indonesia, journalist Sempurna Pasaribu and three members of his family were killed in a deliberately lit fire at his home in North Sumatra. It was later alleged that he was targeted for his reporting on a gambling and drug operation involving military personnel.

Finally, Myanmar, a conflict-ridden State that remains hidden from a shutout and shut down media, remains a deadly beat for those determined to continue to tell the story. The three journalists killed in the country were all killed by military or resistance forces, two in Mon state and one in Rakhine state.

surge in journalist incarcerations, with 257 media workers jailed or remaining behind bars in 2024, more than double the figures recorded and logged in 2023.

China was again the most ruthless jailer, with at least 127 known cases of media workers in jail at the end of the vear, although the actual figure could be much higher. Myanmar followed with 44 journalists while Vietnam recorded 36 journalist inmates, most of them bloggers or freelancers who had expressed criticism of the State. Bangladesh had nine recorded jailed journalists at the end of the year, Hong Kong had eight and India had three.

In Hong Kong, the mass incarceration of 45 pro-democracy activists and unionists in a National Security Trial proved detrimental to the collective autonomy of media professionals in east Asia. The 45 convicted activists include Apple Daily founder Jimmy Lai, who continues to serve a fouryear sentence on alleged lease agreement fraud charges. Arrests, arbitrary detainments and harassment of journalists with the threat of jail are a common theme from Cambodia through to Kazakhstan.

It is clear that, in spaces and States where democracy is under attack, so too are journalists. When vital voices and defenders of the public's right to know are extinguished, the greater majority suffers from the blight of corruption, the abuse of power and a disregard for human rights.

These 22 cases of media workers killed in the line of duty are a litmus test for the capacities of our region's The Asia-Pacific also witnessed a most challenged countries. They are

also the stories of ordinary people doing extraordinary things, who should not have to die for doing their iobs. Here we remember them.

FEATURED CASE: MYANMAR

Within Southeast Asia, Myanmar witnessed a pervasive string of violations against media professionals, amid escalating regional conflicts with rebel groups as well as an ongoing government crackdown on critical voices. On 1 February, Mvanmar's military detained over 45 politicians and activists, declaring a state of emergency for at least one year. Soon after the military takeover, phone lines were cut and internet access was heavily impacted, almost immediately serving to undermine the capacity of journalists and media personnel to cover the unfolding political crisis.

The IFJ recorded three journalist deaths in 2024, all three reported due to gunfire. On 21 August, Democratic Voice of Burma (DVB) freelance reporter Ko Win Htut Oo and freelance journalist Ko Htet Myat Thu were shot and killed following a home raid by the security forces of Myanmar's ruling military junta in Mon state. The raid was allegedly conducted to target resistance fighters sheltered at the residence. Earlier that year. DVB reporter and Western News contributor Myat Thu Tan and several other political prisoners were fatally shot by two military personnel in the western Rakhine state while in military custody. Local media reported that the bodies that were discovered showed signs of torture. The junta had announced a new mandatory conscription law effective from 10 February for all men and women aged 18 to 27. In the following days. thousands of young people had been documented attempting to flee into neighbouring countries to avoid the new legislation.

Former journalist Swapan Bhadra was killed outside his home at approximately 11:00 am, with police taking 18-year-old Sagar Miya into custody. His family allege that he was killed due to his Facebook posts denouncing drugs. State police have claimed that Sagar was the killer, and that he has previously attacked people with knives.

CAMBODIA

Chhoeung Chheung

7 DECEMBER



Chheung died three days after being shot while travelling to the Boeung Per Wildelife Sanctuary in northern Cambodia while gathering news on an illegal forest clearing operation. According to police, a suspect ambushed and attacked the journalist in the Chi Kraeng district of Siem Reap province, with Chheung sustaining fatal injuries to his abdomen.





INDIA

Ashutosh Srivastava

13 MAY

Unkonwn assailants fatally shoot Srivastava while travelling from his home to a market near the Uttar Pradesh city of Jaunpur. He had received threats prior to his killing, reportedly linked to his coverage of illegal cow slaughter in the region. Police failed to give him protection, despite his requests.

Shivshankar Jha

25 JUNE

Journalist Shivshankar Jha was stabbed near his home. He was transferred to a hospital, but died before he could be treated. His family claims his killing was orchestrated by local organised crime interests.

Salman Ali Khan

17 SEPTEMBER

Shot while driving with his 9-year-old son in the western Rajgarh district of Madhya Pradesh. He had previously been attacked due a personal enmity in 2023. Investigations are ongoing.

INDONESIA

Sempurna Pasaribu

27 JUNE

The home of Sempurna Pasaribu was set alight on 27 June, killing him and three family members. An investigation including AJI (Alliance of Independant Journalists) found that the fire had been deliberately set in relation to his reporting on gambling and drug dealings in northern Sumatra.









Aidos Sadyk

2 JULY



According to Aidos' wife, Natalya Sadykov, the Khazak journalist who had fled to Ukraine was shot while driving near his home in Kyiv's Shevchenkivsky district when a man emerged and fired into the vehicle, striking Aidos in the head. According to Al Jazeera, Ukrainian authorities have described the killing as 'carefully planned'. Following the attack, the journalist was hospitalised, and was rendered comatose. The journalist's wife confirmed he had died in a Facebook post.

MYANMAR

Myat Thu Tan



31 JANUARY

Shot by two military personnel while held in custody on charges under Myanmar's draconian 505 law. Body was found to be tortured and discarded in a bomb shelter.

Ko Win Htut Oo

21 AUGUST

Over twenty security personnel stormed the home of freelance journalist Ko Win Htut Oo at approximately 9:00am, firing into the building. Ko Win Htut Oo was killed and another individual allegedly associated with rebel group Kyaikto Revolution Force (KRF) was killed.

Ko Htet Myat Thu

21 AUGUST

Over twenty security personnel storm the home of Ko Win Htut Oo at approximately 9:00am, firing into the building. Ko Htut Myat Thu is reportedly taken into custody and killed.

PAKISTAN



Sagheer Ahmed Laar

14 MARCH

Three unknown persons on motorcycles fired into the pharmacy where Laar was working part-time. He died while receiving medical attention at a nearby hospital. Known for his coverage of local political and criminal figures, Laar's brother claims the killing could be work-related.



15 MAY

Siyal was shot several times by two unknown men on motorcycles while travelling to Muzaffarharh in Punjab's inner south. He was transferred to a nearby hospital, but died of his injuries later that day.

Kamran Dawar

21 MAY

Dawar was shot by armed assailants on motrocycles in his home village. Prior to his death, he had received threatening phone calls.

Nasrullah Gadani

24 MAY

Gadani was shot three times while travelling from his home to a nearby press club. He was transferred between medical institutions, but died three days later due to damage to his heart.

Khalil Jibran

18 JUNE

Jibran was attacked near his home while returning from a dinner party in the Sultan Khel district. Jibran was travelling with friends, including lawyer Sajjad Khan, when their vehicle was stopped by two armed men, who ordered the four passengers out of the vehicle. According to police, Jibran had received threats from terrorists before his killing.

Malik Zafar Iqbal Naich

13 DECEMBER

Two unidentified assailants attacked Malik Zafar Iqbal Naich while he was distributing newspapers in the early morning of December 12 in the south of Punjab.



Shot three times in the abdomen by unidentified assailants on a motorcycle near her home in Zamboanga City. She managed to walk home to inform her daughter of her injuries before being transferred to Zamboanga City Medical Centre, where she was declared dead at approximately 9.37 p.m.







Europe: Four media workers killed, dozens of cases of impunity

In 2024, the war in Ukraine remained the most pressing concern in Europe, as journalists risked their lives daily on the front lines. The European Federation of Journalists (EFJ) documented the death of four media workers in Ukraine and Russia: Valery Kozhin, Nikita Tsitsagi, Ryan Evans and Viktoria Roshchyna.



Ukrainian journalist Viktoria Roshchyna, who been had in Russian custody. reportedly died on 19 September while being transferred from a pre-trial deten-

tion centre to Moscow. On 3 August 2023, Roshchyna informed her family that she had successfully crossed the border into Russia. After that, all contact ceased and her whereabouts became unknown. For nearly a year, Russian authorities provided no information.

In April 2024, her father received confirmation from Russian authorities that Roshchyna was under arrest, though no further details were provided regarding the charges against her or the conditions of her detention.

According to Mediazona, Roshchyna reportedly died while being transported from a high-security prison to Moscow. However, Russian authorities have not disclosed any details regarding the circumstances of her death and have refused to return her body to her family. Ukraine has opened an investigation into her death.

The EFJ and the IFJ have called on Russia to immediately launch a full investigation into Roshchyna's death, publicly disclose the circumstances, prosecute those responsible and return her remains to her family without delay. The lack of transparency and accountability surrounding Roshchyna's tragic fate underscores the urgent need for justice and press freedom in conflict zones.



In 2024, we also recorded the death of Reuters safety adviser Ryan Evans, who was killed on 24 August in a missile strike that hit the Hotel Sapphire in Kramatorsk, eastern Ukraine. On 20 December 2024, the Office of the Prosecutor-General of Ukraine reported that the Security Service of Ukraine (SBU) suspected the Russian colonel general Alexey Kim of being responsible for giving the order to carry out the missile strike on the Hotel Sapphire. Kim was charged with war crimes.

Two Russian journalists were killed in separate incidents in Russia's occupied Donetsk region in eastern Ukraine. News.ru journalist Nikita Tsitsagi died on 16 June in a drone attack amidst ongoing battles.





Earlier, Valery Kozhin, a cameraman for Russian state-controlled media NTV, also died after a shelling attack near Horlivka, on 13 June. We urged the authorities to conduct a swift investigation into the deaths of the journalists.



In addition to the murders recorded during the year, the number of cases of impunity continues to be particularly alarming in Europe. We have documented 43 cases of murders of journalists going unpunished: 19 in Kosovo, six in Turkey, five in Ukraine, three in Serbia, two in Greece and Azerbaijan, and one each in Poland, Malta, Montenegro, Slovakia, the United Kingdom and Cyprus.

In Serbia, on 2 February 2024, the Belgrade Court of Appeals acquitted four former members of the Serbian secret service (RDB). They had previously been convicted of the murder of Serbian journalist Slavko Ćuruvija on 11 April 1999. Ćuruvija, the owner of Dnevni Telegraf and Evropljanin, was known for his criticism of Slobodan Milošević's government.

The court concluded that, in the absence of reliable direct or indi-

rect evidence, the allegations had not been proven beyond reasonable doubt. The ruling represents a significant setback, sending the message that perpetrators and masterminds of crimes against journalists can operate with impunity.

We know, at the EFJ and IFJ, that the murder of a journalist is often preceded by death threats, denigration or physical attacks: these must all therefore be investigated from the outset. Impunity begins when a complaint is not followed up by action. We do not want the list of murders committed with impunity to get any longer. We will continue to urge the relevant authorities to resolve cases that are still unresolved, some of which have been going on for decades.

MIDDLE EAST AND ARAB WORLD

The year 2024 saw an alarming increase in attacks on journalists in the Middle East and the Arab world. consolidating the region's status as the most dangerous place for media workers for the second year running. The war that broke out in Gaza, Palestine, on 7 October 2023, resulted in tragic loss of life among Palestinian media professionals, followed by bloody violence in Lebanon and Syria that also affected journalists.

77 journalists were killed in the region in 2024, including 64 in Palestine, six in Lebanon and four in Syria. That amounts to 55% of the total number of journalists killed in the world that year.

2024 SAW THE **CONSOLIDATION OF** THE REGION STATUS AS THE MOST DANGEROUS PLACE FOR MEDIA WORKERS

Palestine has become one of the deadliest countries for media professionals in the history of modern journalism. Every name on the casualty list testifies to the extreme dangers faced by these journalists, as they strive to document local realities.

The violence was not limited to these three countries. In Irag and Sudan, persistent conflict and a deteriorating security situation have also led to the killings of journalists. In addition to the direct physical risks, these media professionals are under constant pressure, facing harassment, arbitrary arrests and increasing censorship in particular. These hostile conditions hinder their work and jeopardise not just their physical

safety but also their psychological well-being.

Although protective equipment such as bullet-proof vests and helmets have become essential tools to minimise the risks, they have not been able to save the lives of many journalists. The documented attacks show that many of them were deliberately targeted, in flagrant violation of international laws designed to protect civilians, including media workers, in conflict According to the IFJ's latest data, zones. This underscores the urgent

> need for a more rigorous application of international standards, such as the adoption of the IFJ-led UN Convention on the Safety and Independence of Journalists and Other Media

Professionals to guarantee the safety of journalists on the ground.

Given these dangers, it is essential to promote a culture of safety within the media sector. Risk awareness training, access to appropriate equipment and the adoption of enhanced security protocols are all crucial measures to minimise losses. However, these initiatives must be accompanied by a solid international commitment. Governments, international organisations, journalists' unions and associations, and press freedom advocates must work together to develop longterm solutions and to bring to justice those responsible for attacks on iournalists.

The massacres in Gaza, Lebanon and Syria are unfortunately just one illustration of a wider problem. They reflect a reality in which journalism, essential

for documenting human suffering and rights abuses, is under constant threat. Without the courage and determination of journalists, the truth about war crimes and human rights violations will often remain hidden.

In conclusion, the year 2024 exposed the immeasurable risks faced by journalists in conflict zones. The tragic

events in the Middle East and the Arab world are a reminder of the urgent need for international mobilisation to guarantee journalists' safety and to protect freedom of information. It is imperative that we support these media professionals, not only to honour those who have lost their lives. but also to ensure a future for free and independent journalism - the cornerstone of any democratic society.

11 JULY



On 8 July, the Turkish air force targeted journalists from Chra TV, Tizi and Chra FM in a Qasabi complex in Sinjar district. The bombing killed journalist Murad Mirza and seriously injured two journalists Madya Hassan and Khalaf Haidar.

Hero Baha al-Din

Golestan Tara

23 AUGUST

On 23rd August, in the morning, on the road linking Sulaymaniyah city and the district of Sayyid Sadiq, a Turkish drone bombed a car carrying a group of media personnel from Sterk TV, which works within the framework of the Chatr Media Company licensed by the Kurdistan Regional Government. The drone strike resulted in the car being hit, which resulted in the death of the two journalists, and Rebin Bakr, the person responsible for digital media for the Chatr Media Company, was seriously injured in the attack.



Hadi Al-Sayed

23 SEPTEMBER



Journalist Hadi Al-Sayed, who worked for the Lebanese TV channel Al Mayadeen, succumbed to his injuries on 23 September after his home in southern Lebanon was hit by an Israeli airstrike, in the deadliest day for the country since 2006.

Kamel Karaki

26 SEPTEMBER



Journalist Kamel Karaki, who worked as a cameraman for Al Manar TV was killed in an Israeli airstrike targeting the town of Qantara in South Lebanon on 24 September. He had worked for the channel for twenty-five years.

Ahmad Akil Hamzeh

8 OCTOBER

Driver and long-time collaborator of Italy's public broadcaster RAI, Ahmad Akil Hamzeh, died from a heart attack on 8 October, after the Tg3 media crew was assaulted first by an armed manand then by a group of people near the southern city of Sidon in southern Lebanon.

Ghassan Najjar Mohammad Reda Wissam Qassim

25 OCTOBER



On 25 October, an Israeli airstrike killed three journalists that who sleeping in a compound in Hasbaiyaa, southern Lebanon. Al Mayadeen Media Network mourned the death of two media workers, camera operator Ghassan Najjar and broadcast engineer Mohammad Reda, who were in southern Lebanon covering the war. A third journalist, Wissam Qassim, who was a camera operator for Al Manar TV, lost his life in the same airstrike. According to Associated Press, outside of the now-collapsed building that was rented by various media outlets, cars makred 'PRESS' are covered in dust and rubble.

PALESTINE

Akram Al-Shafei

05 JANUARY

On 5 January, journalist Akram Al-Shafei, a correspondent for Safa News Agency, died after being seriously injured by an Israeli aristrike two months before during the siege of Al-Shifa hospital in Gaza city, PJS and media reported.

Hamza Al-Dahdouh & Mustafa Thuraya

07 JANUARY

On 7 January, journalist Hamza Al-Dahdouh, the son of Al Jazeera's Gaza bureau chief, Wael Al-Dahdouh, was killed together with journalist Mustafa Thuraya, when an Israel drone hit their car as they traveled on assignment near Rafah, several local and international media and PJS reported. Hamza Al Dahdouh was working for Al Jazeera and Mustafa Thuraya was a freelance videographer working for Agence France Presse.









Heba Al-Abdallah

09 JANUARY

On 9 January, PJS confirmed the killing of Palestinian journalist Heba Al-Abdallah, who lost her life when an Israeli bombing hit her home in the southern city of Khan Yunis in the Gaza Strip, media reported.

Ahmad Bdeir

10 JANUARY

On 10 January, Palestinian journalist Ahmad Bdeir, who worked for local magazine Hadaf News, was killed as a result of an Israeli bombardment outside the Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital in Deir al-Balah in the central Gaza Strip, PJS and media reported.



Mohammed Jamal Sabahi Al Thalathin 11 JANUARY

On 11 January, PJS confirmed the death of Mohammed Jamal Sabahi Al Thalathini, who worked as a journalist for Al Quds TV and was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit his home in the south of Gaza city.



Yazan Al-Zuweidi 14 JANUARY

On 14 January, photographer Yazan Al-Zuweidi, who worked for Al-Ghad TV, was killed in an Israeli airstrike in the city of Beit Hanoun in northern Gaza, according to PJS and Al Ghad.



lyad Ahmed Al-Ruwahi

26 JANUARY

On 26 January, journalist lyad Ahmed Al-Ruwahi, who worked as a correspondent and presenter for Voice of Al Aqsa Radio, was killed together with members of his family when an Israeli airstrike hit his home in Al-Hasayna area of Al Nuseirat refugee camp in the Gaza Strip, PJS reported.

Mohamed Abdel El Fatah Atta Allah

29 JANUARY

On 29 January, Palestinian journalist Mohamed Abdel El Fatah Atta Allah, who worked as an editor for Al-Risala newspaper, was killed with members of his family in an Israeli bombardment that hit his house in Al Shati refugee camp in northern Gaza Strip, according to PJS.



Nafez Abdel Jawad

8 FERBUARY



On 11 January, PJS confirmed the death of Mohammed Jamal Sabahi Al Thalathini, who worked as a journalist for Al Quds TV and was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit his home in the south of Gaza city.

Alaa al-Hams

12 FEBRUARY

On 12 February, journalist Alaa al-Hams, who worked for local media, died of her wounds, according to PJS and media. Al-Hams was seriously injured two weeks ago, when an Israeli bombing hit her home in al-Geneina neighbourhood in the city of Rafah, southern Gaza Strip.

Angham Ahmed Adwan

12 FEBRUARY

Angham Ahmed Adwan, who worked for Libyan TV channel February, was killed following an Israeli airstrike that hit her home in Jabalia city.

Mohammad Yaghi

23 FEBRUARY

On 23 February, PJS confirmed the killing of photographer Mohammad Yaghi in an Israel bombing near Al-Aqsa hospital in Deir al-Balah in the central Gaza Strip. According to Al Jazeera, Yaghi worked as a professional photographer for a number of international media, including Al Jazeera Network.

Ibrahim Mahamid

1 MARCH

On 1 March, PJS confirmed the death of journalist Ibrahim Mahamid, who died of his wounds five months after being injured by Israeli fire. Mahamid worked as a presenter and cameraman for Al-Salam TV, Al-Shaab TV and other local channels, and was a member of PJS for about 30 years, the Syndicate reported.

Mohammed Khader Ahmad Salama

5 MARCH

On 5 March, journalist and presenter at Al Aqsa TV, Mohammed Khader Ahmad Salama, was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit his home in Deir al-Balah in the central Gaza Strip, PJS reported.

Abdel Rahman Saima Mohammed al-Rifi

15 MARCH

Abdel Rahman Saima, who worked for Raqmi TV, was killed in an Israeli bombing in Gaza City. On the same day, photographer Mohammed al-Rifi succumbed to his injuries in southern Gaza City.

Saher Akram Rayyan

25 MARCH

Saher Akram Rayyan, was killed in an Israeli airstrike in Gaza City.

Tariq Al-Sayed Abu Sakhil

28 MARCH

Tariq Al-Sayed Abu Sakhil was killed during the invasion of Al Shifaa complex by Israeli army.

Mohammed Abu Sakhi

28 MARCH

Mohammed Abu Sakhil, who worked for Shams News Agency was killed during Israel's military raid on Al-Shifa hospital and surrounding areas in Gaza City that lasted for two weeks, Shams News Agency reported.

Mohammad Basam Al Jamal

25 APRIL

Mohammad Basam Al Jamal was killed after suffering critical injuries in an Israeli airstrike on his family home in the Al-Jenenah neighborhood in Rafah, southern Gaza, according to the Beirut-based press freedom group SKeyes, the privately owned Al-Ghad TV channel, the Palestinian Journalists' Syndicate, and the Qatar funded Al-Araby Al-Jadeed.

Mustafa Ayyad

6 MAY

Mustafa Ayyad was killed after he was critically injured by an Israeli airstrike on his home in Azzaytoun neighborhood in northern Gaza, according to multiple media reports. Those sources said that Ayyad suffered injuries to his head, heart, and liver, and was taken to Al-Maamadani hospital where he was pronounced dead. Ayyad worked for Al Jazeera Mubashar and Al Jazeera Net on freelance basis during the war, according to Al Jazeera.



Baha Akasha

11 MAY

Baha Akasha was killed in an Israeli airstrike on his home in Al-Qasasib neighborhood in Jabalia refugee camp, northern Gaza, along with his son Hamza and his wife, according to Al Jazeera, Al-Araby TV, the privately owned Palestinian news agency Maan, and the privately owned Lebanese newspaper Annahar.

Hael Al-Najjar

15 MAY

Hael Al-Najjar was killed when his home on Old Gaza Street in Jabalia was targeted by Israeli airstrikes.

Mahmoud Jahjouh

17 MAY

Juhjouh, a Palestinian photographer who worked for the local Palestine Post Network, was killed along with his wife, children, and mother, in an Israeli airstrike on his home in Sheikh Radwan neighborhood of Gaza City, according to his outlet and media reports. Those reports mentioned that Juhjouh had been displaced several times with his family, and had returned to his house after the Israeli army withdrew from northern Gaza.

Ola al-Dahdouh

31 MAY

Was killed in an Israeli bombing of her home on Al-Jalaa Street in central Gaza City.

Mohammad Abu Sharia

1 JULY

Mohammad Abu Sharia, succumbed to his injuries sustained from an Israeli missile launched near the journalist's home in Gaza City.

Saadi Madoukh Adeeb Sukkar

5 JULY

Saadi Madoukh, and journalist Adeeb Sukkar, who worked for the same media, were killed in an Israeli strike in the Daraj neighbourhood of Gaza City.

Mohammad Al Sakni

5 JULY

Mohammad Al Sakni, was killed when a strike hit his home in Al-Tuffah neighbourhood, east of Gaza City.

Amjad Al-Jahjouh Wafa Abu Dabaa

6 JULY

The couple formed by Palestine Now news agency correspondent, Amjad Al-Jahjouh, and programme producer and presenter at the Islamic University radio station, Wafa Abu Dabaan, were killed in an Israeli strike in the Nuseirat refugee camp in the middle of the Gaza Strip.

Rizq Abu Shakyan

6 JULY

Rizq Abu Shakyan, was killed in an Israeli strike that hit his home in the Nuseirat refugee camp.

Mohammad Manhal Abu Armanah

13 JULY

Mohammad Manhal Abu Armanah, was killed in an Israeli strike that hit tents of displaced people in Khan Yunis, southern of the Gaza Strip.

Mohammad Majid Abu Daqa

29 JULY

The PJS reported the killing of journalist of Mohammad Majid Abu Daqa in an Israeli strike in Khan Yunis, southern of the Gaza Strip.

Tariq Al-Sayed Abu Sakhil Rami al-Refee

31 JULY

Ismail al-Ghoul and cameraman Rami al-Refee, who worked for Al Jazeera Arabic, were killed in an Israeli air attack in Shati refugee camp, west of Gaza City.

Tamim Muammar Abdullah Al-Sousi

9 AUGUST

Tamim Muammar, who worked for the Palestinian Broadcasting Corporation - Voice of Palestine, and journalist Abdullah Al-Sousi, who worked for Al Aqsa TV, were killed in two different Israeli airstrikes in Khan Yunis, southern of the Gaza Strip.

Ibrahim Muhareb

18 AUGUST

Ibrahim Muhareb, who worked for a number of media, was killed by Israeli gunfire and shelling in western Khan Yunis when the Israeli tanks entered the city in southern Gaza.

Hamza Murtaja

20 AUGUST

Hamza Murtaja was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit Mustafa Hafez School, in western Gaza City.

Hossam Manal Al-Dabbaka

22 AUGUST

Hossam Manal Al-Dabbaka was killed with his wife, children and other family members when their apartment was hit by an Israeli strike in the Al-Maghazi refugee camp in central Gaza.

Ali Taima

26 AUGUST

Ali Taima, a cameraman for Al-Awda TV channel, was killed in an Israeli airstrike in the Mawasi area of Khan Younis.

Mohammad Abed Rabbo

28 AUGUST

Mohammad Abed Rabbo of Al-Manara Media Production Company was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit his apartment in central Gaza.

Wafa Aludaini

30 SEPTEMBER

Wafa Aludaini, along with her husband and two children, was killed in an Israeli airstrike in Deir Al-Balah, central Gaza, according to media reports.

Mohammad Al Tanani

9 OCTOBER

Mohammad Al Tanani, who worked for Al Aqsa TV, by Israeli airstrikes in the area of Jabalia, northern Gaza. In the same bombardment, reporter Tamer Lubbad, also working for Al Aqsa TV, was injured. Al Jazeera's cameraman Fadi Al-Wahidi was wounded by Israeli gunfire while reporting the situation in northern Gaza.

Hassan Hamad

6 OCTOBER

Hassan Hamad was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit his home in Jabalia refugee camp, northern Gaza. Al Jazeera reported Hamad's killing and stated that the journalist was warned by an Israeli officer to stop filming in Gaza.

Saed Radwan Hamza Abu Salmiya Haneen Mahmoud Baroud

27 OCTOBER

Saed Radwan, head of the digital media department at Al-Aqsa TV, Hamza Abu Salmiya, journalist at Sand News Agency, and Haneen Mahmoud Baroud, journalist at the Al Quds Foundation lost their lives in an Israeli airstrike that hit Asmaa 'B' School in Al-Shati refugee camp in the northern Gaza Strip.

Bilal Muhammad Rajab

1 NOVEMBER

Bilal Muhammad Rajab, who worked for Al-Quds Al-Youm channel, was killed in an attack by an Israeli drone near the Firas market in Gaza City.

Mohammed Saleh Al-Sharif

16 NOVEMBER

Rizq Abu Shakyan, was killed in an Israeli strike that hit his home in the Nuseirat refugee camp.

Ahmed Abu Shariya

19 NOVEMBER

Ahmed Abu Shariya, who worked for Tasnim Agency, was killed in an Israeli airstrike that targeted the Sabra neighbourhood in southern Gaza.



Mamdouh Quneita

30 NOVEMBER

Mamdouh Quneita, who worked for Al Aqsa TV, was killed when an Israeli drone shot him in the courtyard of Al-Ahli Hospital in Gaza City.

Maysara Salah

2 DECEMBER

Quds News Network reported the killing of one of its employees, journalist Maysara Salah, who was injured near Awni Al-Harthani School in northern Gaza and died at Kamal Adwan Hospital.

Eman El-Shanti



11 DECEMBER

Eman El-Shanti, was killed in an Israeli airstrike that hit an apartment in Al-Malash Tower in Sheikh Radwan, northwestern Gaza City. The strike also killed El-Shanti's husband and their three children.

Mohammed Baalousha Ahmed Al-Louh killed Mohammed Jaber Al-Qerinawi

15 DECEMBER

Fadi Hassouna Ibrahim Al-Sheikh Ali Mohammed Al-Ladda Faisal Abu Al-Qumsan Ayman Al-Jadi

26 DECEMBER

According to the PJS and local media reports, five journalists working for satellite channel Al-Quds Today were covering events near al-Awda Hospital, based in the Nuseirat refugee camp, when their clearly marked broadcasting van was hit by an Israeli air strike on 26 December.



Safaa Ahmad

1 OCTOBER



Woman journalist Safaa Ahmad, who worked as an anchor for Syrian state television, lost her life on 1 October in an Israeli airstrike on the capital Damascus. Ahmad is the first journalist killed in the country in 2024.

Anas Alkharboutli

4 DECEMBER



On 4 December, award-winning Syrian photographer Anas Alkharboutli, was killed in an airstrike that hit a group of Syrian journalists in the Morek area, north of Hama. Alkharboutli and four other journalists stopped their cars to photograph a warplane in the Morek area while covering the rebel offensive that started on 27 November in northern Syria. Then, they heard a loud sound. Although their cars were unmarked, there were other vehicles in the area and the journalists wore protective vests marked with the word 'press', the Washington Post reported.

Nazim Daştan Cîhan Bilgin

19 DECEMBER

Kurdish journalists Nazim Daştan and Cîhan Bilgin, working for Kurdish media, were killed on 19 December in a reportedly Turkish drone attack. They were covering the fighting between Ankarabacked militia and US-backed Kurdish fighters in northern Syria.



REPORT ON THE IFJ INTERNATIONAL SAFETY FUND FOR 2024

In 2024, the IFJ's International Safety Fund (ISF) received an incredible wave of solidarity, with over €146,000 in donations, including €127,000 for Palestine.

The media coverage of this conflict led to an exceptional outpouring of solidarity from our unions, in particular, and donations therefore followed the same trend in the last quarter

of 2024. In this case, ISF is working directly with the Palestinian Journalists' Syndicate. ISF HAS SENT MORE THAN €186,000 TO OUR COLLEAGUES IN PALESTINE the families of journalists and media staff whose 'bread-win - ner' has been killed and who have no means to sustain themselves. Whenever the IFJ gives assistance there is a monitoring and reporting process to ensure that the money goes to where it is intended. In 2010 the IFJ revised the Safety Fund rules. These are available on request from the IFJ secretariat. The IFJ Safety Fund can only conti-

> nue to assist journalists if its future is secured. In order to help journalists, money must come in. But, most impor-

Since the start of the war in Palestine in October 2023, ISF has sent around €186,000 to journalists in Gaza through its affiliate, the Palestinian Journalists' Syndicate, mainly to buy power banks and first aid kits. As far as other contributions are concerned, ISF is pursuing its missions by sending more modest funds to journalists in difficulty. The countries most in need are Yemen (€7,000). Next come Turkey (€4,000) and Tunisia (€4,000), two countries where journalists have faced considerable challenges.

International Code of Practice

for the Safe Conduct of Journalism

The dangers posed to journalists and media staff working in dangerous situations and conflict zones are the subject of extensive record. The IFJ has recorded the deaths of more than 2650 journalists and media staff over the past 30 years.

Many journalists are killed, injured or harassed in war zones, either targeted by one side or another or caught in the crossfire of violence. Others are the victims of premeditated assault and intimidation either by criminals, terrorists or by agencies of the state — the police, the military or the security forces — acting secretly and illegally.

Very often there is little that journalists or media organisations can do to avoid casualties. There will, inevitably, be accidents, no matter how much care is taken to provide protection and there is little one can do when those targeting media use ruthless and brutal methods to crush journalistic inquiry.

However, there are steps that journalists and media organisations should take to minimise the risks to staff. In particular, the following are vital considerations in providing protection: Adequate preparation, training and social protection is vital. It is essential that journalists and media staff be in a state of readiness when difficulties arise. There should be a framework for providing individuals with health care and social protection.

Media professionals must be informed and inform themselves about the political, physical, and social terrain in

which they are working. They must not contribute to the uncertainty and insecurity of their conditions through ignorance or reckless behaviour.

Media organisations must guard against risk-taking for competitive advantage, and should promote co-operation among journalists whenever conditions exist which are potentially hazardous.

THROUGH ADEQUATE PREPARATION, TRAINING AND SOCIAL PROTECTION, JOURNALISTS AND MEDIA STAFF CAN BE IN A STAFF CAN BE IN A

Governments must remove obstacles to journalism. They must not restrict unnecessarily the freedom of movement of journalists or compromise the right of news media to gather, produce and disseminate information in secure and safe conditions.

Journalists should be allowed to gather news without interference. Physical interference with filming or other journalistic work must be prohibited.



With these considerations in mind, the IFJ calls on journalists' groups, media organisations and all relevant public authorities to respect the following International Code of Practice for the Safe Conduct of Journalism:

1. Journalists and other media staff shall be properly equipped for all assignments including the provision of first-aid materials, communication tools, adequate transport facilities and, where necessary, protective clothing;

2. Media organisations and, where appropriate, state authorities shall provide risk awareness training for those journalists and media workers who are likely to be involved in assignments where dangerous conditions prevail or may be reasonably expected;

3. Public authorities shall inform their personnel of the need to respect the rights of journalists and shall instruct them to respect the physical integrity of journalists and media staff while at work;

4. Media organisations shall provide social protection for all staff engaged in journalistic activity outside the normal place of work, including life insurance;

5. Media organisations shall provide, free of charge, medical treatment and health care, including costs of recuperation and convalescence, for journalists and media workers who are the victims of injury or illness as a result of their work outside the normal place of work; 6. Media organisations shall protect freelance or part-time employees. They must receive, on an equal basis, the same social protection and access to training and equipment as that made available to fully employed staff.

The IFJ is the world's largest organisation of journalists with members in more than 150 countries. Today the IFJ spans the world with a range of programmes and solidarity activities that help to strengthen journalists' trade unions. IFJ Offices around the world highlight the need for safety of journalists. The Federation in the past opened offices in Afghanistan, Algeria, Colombia, the Philippines and Sri Lanka to provide local support for journalists most in need.







GLOBAL CHARTER OF ETHICS FOR JOURNALISTS

The IFJ Global Charter of Ethics for Journalists was adopted at the 30th IFJ World Congress in Tunis on 12 June 2019. It completes the IFJ Declaration of Principles on the Conduct of Journalists (1954), known as the ""Bordeaux Declaration

The right of everyone to have access to information and ideas, reiterated in Article 19 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, underpins the journalist's mission. The journalist's responsibility towards the public takes precedence over any other responsibility, in particular towards their employers and the public authorities. Journalism is a profession, which requires time, resources and the means to practise – all of which are essential to its independence. This international declaration specifies the guidelines of conduct for journalists in the research, editing, transmission, dissemination and commentary of news and information, and in the description of events, in any media whatsoever.

1. Respect for the facts and for the right of the public to truth is the first duty of the journalist.

2. In pursuance of this duty, the journalist shall at all times defend the principles of freedom in the honest collection and publication of news, and of the right of fair comment and criticism. He/she will make sure to clearly distinguish factual information from commentary and criticism.

3. The journalist shall report only in accordance with facts of which he/ she knows the origin. The journalist shall not suppress essential information or falsify any document. He/she will be careful to reproduce faithfully statements and other material that non-public persons publish in social media

4. The journalist shall use only fair methods to obtain information, images, documents and data and he/she will always report his/her status as a journalist and will refrain from using hidden recordings of images and sounds, except where it is impossible for him/her to collect information that is overwhelmingly in the public interest. He/she will demand free access to all sources of information and the right to freely investigate all facts of public interest.

5. The notion of urgency or immediacy in the dissemination of information shall not take precedence over the verification of facts, sources and/or the offer of a reply.

6. The journalist shall do the utmost to rectify any errors or published information which is found to be inaccurate in a timely, explicit, complete and transparent manner.

7. The journalist shall observe professional secrecy regarding the source of information obtained in confidence.

8. The journalist will respect privacy. He/she shall respect the dignity of the persons named and/or represented and inform the interviewee whether the conversation and other material is intended for publication. He/she shall show particular consideration to inexperienced and vulnerable interviewees.

9. Journalists shall ensure that the dissemination of information or opinion does not contribute to hatred or prejudice and shall do their utmost to avoid facilitating the spread of discrimination on grounds such as geographical, social or ethnic origin, race, gender, sexual orientation, language, religion, disability, political and other opinions.



10. The journalist will consider serious professional misconduct to be

- plagiarism
- distortion of facts
- slander, libel, defamation, unfounded accusations

11. The journalist shall refrain from acting as an auxiliary of the police or other security services. He/she will only be required to provide information already published in a media outlet.

12. The journalist will show solidarity with his/her colleagues, without renouncing his/her freedom of investigation, duty to inform, and right to engage in criticism, commentary, satire and editorial choice.

13. The journalist shall not use the freedom of the press to serve any other interest and shall refrain from receiving any unfair advantage or personal gain because of the dissemination or non-dissemination of information. He/she will avoid or put an end to - any situation that could lead him/her to a conflict of interest in the exercise of his/her profession. He/she will avoid any confusion between his activity and that of advertising or propaganda. He/she will refrain from any form of insider trading and market manipulation.

14. The journalist will not undertake any activity or engagement likely to put his/her independence in danger. He/she will, however, respect the methods of collection/dissemination of information that he / she has freely accepted, such as "off the record", anonymity, or embargo, provided that these commitments are clear and unquestionable.

15. Journalists worthy of the name shall deem it their duty to observe faithfully the principles stated above. They may not be compelled to perform a professional act or to express an opinion that is contrary to his/her professional conviction or conscience.

16. Within the general law of each country the journalist shall recognize in matters of professional honour, the jurisdiction of independent self-regulatory bodies open to the public, to the exclusion of every kind of interference by governments or others.
